# Worship and Prayer Resource for Sunday April 5

Before you sit down, prepare your space. You'll need a candle to light, your Bible, a journal or notebook to write in and something to write with. Then take a walk outside and collect a few leaves.

Now find a quiet place to sit comfortably as we join together in worship at home.

## 9.30am

Light candle and place it in a safe place

As you light it, think of the light of Christ bringing peace into the world and give thanks.

Think of your sisters and brothers in Christ doing the same wherever they are and how that connects us as one people.

Breathe in slowly. Breathe out slowly. Say slowly: "Be still and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10)

In many Churches around the world, this Sunday is a celebration of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. It seems hard to imagine, in our current social climate. No palm branches and celebratory processions today; just some leaves.

Place your leaves alongside your candle, then read these verses.

# Scripture

#### Read Matthew 21:1-11

### Reflection

"Hosanna to the Son of David!" "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" "Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

This was a joyful time in Jerusalem, where God's people had gathered for the Passover festival. A time for great feasting and joyous celebration. As Jesus rode in, the crowds cheered, hailing him as king. Hosanna, "Save us", they cried.'

Jesus must have been an unlikely king, riding on a donkey. He had no crown, no wealth, no power, no political authority.

The celebration of Palm Sunday quickly turned to the sombre events of Holy week. It appears that Jesus' grand and glorious parade made the religious officials, and the Romans, nervous. Jesus' fall from favour was rapid, and within a few days the cheering crowd were instead calling for his crucifixion.

We can be so fickle. It is too easy to get caught up in the crowd, to follow the mass hysteria of whatever is claiming our attention at the time. When one stockpiles toilet paper and handwash, others follow. We are so easily influenced by what those around us do and say. At this time, there is rapidly changing and sometimes unclear information. The media, social networking, family and friends, each overwhelming our minds and our hearts with confusion and commotion.

This Palm Sunday might be a time for you to stop and consider, whose voice do you listen to? It is easy enough to trust when things are going well, in times of joy and celebration. But we can find it more difficult when the going gets tough, we are afraid, and the world seems to be collapsing around us.

We are about to enter Holy Week and reflect more deeply on the events of Jesus' last week, his suffering and death. During that week, each of Jesus' followers were challenged to consider for themselves the question: To whom do you give your allegiance? In whom do you trust?

Through this last week of Jesus, we see his trust. We see his commitment, his ordering of his life and priorities as he seeks first the kingdom of God. We see him stand firm. Most of all, we see his peace in a time of confusion, his compassion in the depths of despair, and his love in the face of hatred.

When life is confusing and fearful, when you don't know where to turn, in whom do you trust?"

What are you most fearful of at this time? What are you confused about? Whose voice do you give priority to? How might you trust God more fully at this time? Write your thoughts in your journal.

- Those who feel isolated, lonely, vulnerable, fearful
- All workers in health, aged care and disability
- School and University staff, teachers and students
- Parents adjusting to the new responsibility of helping their children with schooling at home
- The many who find themselves unemployed
- Those still rebuilding from the nation's bushfires
- Those already at risk due to domestic violence, unstable relationships, chronic illness, addiction, poverty or homelessness
- Your own congregation, and yourself

In this time of COVID-19, we pray:

When we aren't sure, God:

help us be calm;

when information comes from all sides, sometimes correct and sometimes not:

help us to discern;

when fear makes it hard to breathe, and anxiety is the order of the day:

slow us down, God;

help us to reach out with our hearts,

when we can't touch with our hands;

help us to be socially connected,

when we have to be physically apart;

help us to love as perfectly as we can,

knowing that God's love endures forever.v

We are now entering Holy Week, with the feeling that events are getting out of control and there is nothing we can do to stop them. We do so trusting that God is with us in times of confusion and fear. We hold the promise of the cross before us as a symbol of hope and new life.
